#### **EDITORIAL**

What strange mania has infected the Met Office just lately? If their objective is to send the entire populace off to bed of an Autumn evening with a sense of dread, sleeping bags and toothbrushes packed against any of a myriad potential catastrophes, then they are half-way to succeeding. "Britain Braced For Battering" ran the strapline in an otherwise respected publication just the other day as it warned of the perils of approaching Storm Ashley. This storm, gasped the BBC, would produce an "explosive cyclogenesis", before explaining to its more low-brow viewers, such as me, that we would probably be more familiar with the term 'weather bomb'. I wasn't, but the thought was enough to send me scurrying off to check if we still had the candles from last month's birthday cake. In the event, it turned out that some places that often get autumn gales got some autumn gales. The 'bomb', it seemed, was a bit of a UXB.

Have a look at the weather forecast on TV sometime. The map is covered with threatening wedges of blue-ish purple in which are scattered livid blotches of acid yellow. This means it will be wet. On days when it isn't wet, we get fiery streaks of crimson and day-glo orange. This means it might be warm or, as the presenter will inform us in portentous, doom-laden tones, '0.7 degrees higher than the corresponding period last year' or some equally scary equivalent. Over-laying the whole thing is what looks like a swarm of enraged hornets, showing us that it might be breezy.

And then there are the 'meteorological phenomena'. The 'Supermoon' earlier this month, which I excitedly rushed into the garden to clock. Yup - it was a full moon. Other than that, it looked entirely normal. Or 'STEVE'. Steve, in case you unaccountably don't know, stands for 'Strong Thermal Emission Velocity Enhancement ' and is alleged to 'appear as a ribbon and last for 20 minutes to an hour'. Except that it doesn't and didn't. And who can forget that rare opportunity to witness the glorious splendour of the Aurora Borealis just a few weeks back? Well, pretty much everyone, if the crowd of disappointed potential spectators I joined is anything to go by. "Look" said one. "It might be that faint smudge you can see, but only if you look through a camera." And I've lost count of the number of chances to see the Perseid meteor shower, religiously promised every year but never actually visible to anyone without an industrial-strength telescope and six years of training.

Why do they keep foisting all this panic-inducing stuff on us? What are we supposed to do - reinstall an Anderson shelter in the back garden? Time was, the Met Office - and the forecast - was populated by avuncular old chaps in tweeds who would sometimes move a little magnetic picture of a cloud onto the map to signify the arrival of mid-Winter, or tell us comforting stories about things called isobars, which were generally confined to The Bay Of Biscay and other weird foreign places. Today, we get 'Apocalypse Now - The Weather Forecast'.

Still, one thing hasn't changed. They were often wrong then - and they're often wrong now. *Plus ça change...* 

# Local charity enables unpaid carers to write their Will for free

This Free Wills Month, local charity Caring Together has launched their first ever free Will writing service. This enables unpaid carers and others to make a Will online, over the phone or in-person with a local solicitor at no cost to themselves.

The charity supports unpaid, family carers who are looking after someone with a disability or long-term illness. This is why the charity provides vital services including breaks, counselling and specialist support for children who are carers.

As well as this being a quick, easy, and free way to write a Will, particularly for anyone who is currently in a caring role, it is the charity's hope that people will considering leaving a gift in their Will to the charity.

Caring Together's Chief Executive, Miriam Martin said, "We know that for many of the unpaid carers we support putting their affairs in order brings great peace of mind, but the cost of making a Will can be difficult to manage.

"This is why we are offering a number of different ways to make a free Will – including online, by phone, or visiting a local solicitor".

Last year, Caring Together Charity supported over 27,000 people across Cambridgeshire, Peterborough and Norfolk. However, there are over 150,000 reported unpaid carers in these areas.

Although Caring Together Charity covers the cost of the Will, there's no obligation to leave a gift to the charity, and local people can still use the service to write their Will for free.

It is that time of year again when thoughts turn to bonfires, toffee apples, marshmallows and fireworks. A time, as the saying goes, to remember, but what is it that we are remembering?

The rhyme continues, "gunpowder, treason and plot". As many of you will already know, the remembrance is of the attempt, by Guy Fawkes and his co-conspirators, to blow up parliament at the state opening on the 5th November 1605. Their motivation was disappointment that the promise of increased religious freedom under the new King (James I) had not materialised.

There is lots of variety in the Church in Toft and whatever your personal history you're free (and would be very welcome!) to join in celebrating that with us.

Would there be a diagnosis soon, Can I go home this afternoon?

I'm still in the clothes I arrived in last night Face unwashed, hair unbrushed, I must be a sight.

But doctors are in short supply Nobody knows when they'll come by. Amazing how fast one succumbs to dependence Confidence fades, in creeps senescence.

Do not get ill on a Saturday!

Your consultant may be out on the green The specialists are special only Monday to Friday

Notices of meetings and agendas are published on the Parish Council Noticeboard near the bus shelter together with minutes, which can also be viewed at www.toft.org.uk. Among other things, the Council considers local planning applications for the planning authority, the South Cambridgeshire District Council; provides the local recreation area, the People's Hall, litter bins, dog waste bins and the bus shelter; arranges for local verge cutting on behalf of the Cambridgeshire County Council and works with that authority to ensure the maintenance of local footpaths.

#### Next Meeting: The next meeting will be Monday 4th November 2024 at 7.00pm in The People's Hall. All Welcome.

The Council met on Monday 7th October 2024 in the People's Hall.

The meeting opened with a comment from a parishioner on the poor state of the footpath in the Snicket as it is covered. There was no play inspection presented nor were there with moss and weeds are growing along the edges. It will be raised as a priority with the grass cutting contractors.

Apologies were received from Cllrs Christine Watson, with our current providers. Rebecca Harris and Sarah Tebbit.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved.

Improvements to the Queen's Platinum Jubilee area are on hold as Cllr Yeadon is awaiting a response to his bid for funding.

The grass cutting contract for the whole village is to be finalised at the next meeting.

It was agreed that the PC would adopt the CAPALC model Biodiversity policy and it was noted that Toft has already started many of the initiatives outlined. Cllr Miles is to draft a model for Toft village to be considered at the next meeting.

It was, however, decided not to progress the CCC Active Travel Hierarchy consultation nor the Combined Authority Bus Franchising consultation.

Regarding the two applications for Toft People's Hall and the Methodist Chapel to become ACVs (Assets of Community Value), TPH has been applied for and Cllr Yeadon is awaiting further information from the steward of the Methodist Chapel before finalising this application.

The idea of moving the bench on the drift outside the allotments on the eastern side away from the hedge and to a more open aspect was generally approved but, given it is heavy, it will need some more investigation and volunteers before it can be moved.

The cost of new Defibrillator pads was noted and approved.

It was agreed that the mapping website "Parish Online" contained a lot of useful information and could be of assistance in searching for specific data. It was agreed that we would take out a year's subscription and review it again next year.

A letter has been received from a resident in the Birdlings requesting road markings and mirrors to improve visibility. As this still comes within the remit of the developers a letter will be sent to them and at the same time two other issues will be raised - the lack of lights along the cycle path and hedgehog highways in garden fences. These issues had been originally included in the development plans.

We had been informed in a report by Michael Atkins, County Councillor, that we had not been successful in our 20mph bid. There had been 91 requests but funding only for 8 schemes. Cllr. Derbyshire questioned whether the speed monitor could be placed on the opposite side of the road but it was pointed out by Cllr Yeadon that there were designated posts where the speed cameras could be erected. However, it was agreed that, for now, a more rigorous regime would be implemented on the High Street and Comberton Road where the worst offences occur, by moving the speed monitors on a regular basis. The cost of a solar panel for the battery is to be investigated.



# **Golf in Toft**

Orchard Farm in Toft stretched from the Comberton Road down to the northern edge of Great Eversden. 210 acres of the northern end of this largely arable farm were sold to developers by the landowner Paul Tebbit in 1992. The land is located mainly north of the Bourn Brook and, in mediaeval times, formed part of the East Field of Toft Parish. It is dissected N-S by the Greenwich Meridian Line and lies across the E-W routes of both the ancient Lot Way and the Oxford/Cambridge railway line, which was closed in 1967.

The course was designed by former Ryder Cup players Peter Alliss and Clive Clarke who, on one occasion, flew in by helicopter to oversee the building work! The original contractor employed to build the course unfortunately went into receivership in 1993 with the course still unfinished. However, Vivien Saunders (former British Ladies Open Champion) and Jenny Wisson stepped in to ensure completion of the 18-hole, par-73 course and it opened to golfers on April 1st, 1994 as the Comberton Meridian Golf Club. A relatively short, but challenging, course it is now regarded as one of the best in the region and has hosted several prestigious golf tournaments. In the last decade or so the club has come under new management and been renamed the Cambridge Meridian Golf Club. The new owners have produced plans for significant expansion of the facilities, including a hotel, but these are yet to advance further.



#### Firework safety tips

- Only buy fireworks with a CE mark
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks or put them in your pockets or clothing
- Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water
- Never give sparklers to children under five
- Keep your pets indoors throughout the evening
- It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place
- Respect your neighbours don't let off fireworks late at night and remember there are laws to follow.
